Welcome to our end of year newsletter. Our beautiful city has been covered in a blanket of snow as the year draws to a close. And what a full one it has been!

Diversifying Crops

2022 has been (and still is) marked by the war in Ukraine which has shown us – as COVID19 did – the fragile, global nature of our food system and how important it is to diversify and strengthen internal production rather than rely on a handful of crops and countries.

The need for research on and business opportunities for crops that are often called ‘forgotten’ or ‘neglected’ is at the core of the [Forgotten Crops Society](#) which was established by Cambridge Global Food Security IRC in 2020, with collaborators including Professor Michel Ghanem at the UM6P, Morocco. Earlier this year, a letter by Professor Ghanem was published in [Nature](#), [Africa’s forgotten crops could offset growing food insecurity](#). Next year

a special issue of [Plants, People, Planet](#) (IF 5.69), edited by members of the Forgotten Crops Society, will focus on “Forgotten crops, agricultural change, and food heritage.” The deadline for submission is January 31st, 2023.

Forgotten crops will also be the focus of the first **Global Food Security Society International Summer School**. The GFS Society is a student and post-doc group at the University of Cambridge. The Summer School will promote links with African scientists to stimulate enterprise and research. If you are interested in getting involved, please mail [Francesca Re Manning](#).

COP27 and our food system focus

Food and agriculture and their links to the climate crisis have had more attention at [COP27](#) than at previous COPs. This focus was certainly good news, however, as one of our external advisors Tim Benton at Chatham House said in [an interview for Food Navigator](#), there was significant political resistance to fully adopting a systems approach. ‘*COP27 maintained a firm focus on supply-side solutions to tackle food insecurity, avoiding more contentious demand-side issues of ensuring nutritious and sustainable diets for all.*’

Cambridge Global Food Security focuses is on all the three pillars of the food system: food production, supply and distribution, and consumption. These inform our public [Food for Thought](#) online panel events. Last term we held three webinars on consumption looking at healthy eating, food waste and the role of government policy in guiding and influencing shopping and eating choices. Next term our Food for Thought webinars will focus on supply & distribution. On 16 February, 5pm our panel of experts will discuss food sustainability, traceability, and transparency, whilst on 13 March, 5pm we will be looking at why our food system is broken and how it can be fixed. Strategic Research Networks

In May, Global Food Security partnered with Cambridge Infectious Diseases IRC to run **One Health Challenges in Food Systems** a workshop on

preventing infectious disease-driven problems in a changing climate as well as managing disease and antimicrobial resistance in the agricultural landscape. The participants, a group of interdisciplinary researchers, discussed current issues and identified collaboration and funding opportunities.

One Health is only one of our newly created **Strategic Research Networks**. Together with Cambridge Zero and the Alternative Protein Society, we're planning a workshop on the future of meat and alternative proteins at the end of February. As well as mapping internal capacity here in Cambridge and creating links with external partners, we hope that it will stimulate and support projects on alternative proteins that link research with the private sector and policy-making.

Coffee Break Seminar Series

Our on-line Coffee Break Seminar Series (at 2pm on Friday afternoons during term time) continues to provide academics and students (both in Cambridge and from further afield) with a platform to discuss ideas. It encourages interdisciplinary thinking and collaborations and exposes us to international research and practice.
