The '<u>Sustainable and Healthy Food Production</u>' Research Symposium that we organised with Cambridge Zero took place on March 21st 2024 at the West Hub in Cambridge featured presentations on ground-breaking research with impact on food security and climate change taking place at the University of Cambridge. <u>Read about the Research Symposium here.</u>

Last month Francesca joined the UKRI Agri-food for Net Zero Network+ (AFN) Big Tent Event in Sheffield. It was great to network with some of the 200 participants, all of whome are working for change in the UK agri-food system. We focussed on translating research and policy priorities policy into funding themes for the <u>2024 round of scoping studies</u>, building on the Network's <u>Research and Policy Priorities Report</u> published in March. The programme was designed around inclusivity and involvement, to maximise opportunities for networking, with a mix of panel sessions, breakout discussions and fantastic keynote speeches including <u>Sue</u> <u>Pritchard, Chief Executive of The Food, Farming, and Countryside</u> <u>Commission (FFCC), Judith Batchelar, Director of Food Matters</u> <u>International, former director at Sainsbury's and Deputy Chair of the Environment Agency and Navaratnam Partheeban, co-founder of the British Veterinary Ethnicity and Diversity Society (BVEDS).</u>



EIT-Food Algal Biotechnology Course



Last week 35 participants representing 19 nationalities took part in the <u>EIT</u> <u>Food</u> Professional Development Course on Algal Biotechnology here in Cambridge at the <u>Department of Plant Sciences</u>, the <u>Algal Innovation</u> <u>Centre</u> and the <u>SLCU</u>. We enjoyed meeting them and finding out more about the importance of algal biotech to food security.

Participants had the opportunity to delve into all aspects of algal biotech (from strain identification and engineering to large-scale cultivation and analysis techniques) over 5 days of scientific talks and practical activities. They also had lots of fun with social activities that were not just about networking and science, but about building connections and sharing laughs.

The course was hosted by the Department of Plant Sciences, Plant Metabolism group, together with the <u>Scottish Association for Marine</u> <u>Science</u> (SAMS), the <u>Fraunhofer</u> <u>Institute</u> (Germany) and <u>Matís</u> (Iceland). The feedback from participants has been overwhelmingly positive. The organisers are looking forward to seeing

how the course alumni will apply the knowledge and skills they gained.
