FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Wellcome Trust/ Riksbankens Jubilieumsfond/ Volkswagen Foundation: Europe and Global Challenges. €500,000 - €900,000 to support collaboration between researchers in Europe and at least one other region (eg. Africa) taking an innovative approach to global challenges related to climate change, global health, social inequality, migration, or terrorism. Must have social science focus. Deadline 1 Sept 2016.

STFC's Challenge Led Applied Systems Programme (CLASP) Energy and Environment. STFC has launched a new call offering £1.5M to fund a range of projects from short feasibility studies to large developmental projects that will use STFC funded research to solve key challenges in the Energy and Environment sectors. Challenge areas are outlined in the CLASP Guidance notes, and include 'Animal & Plant health: rapid and low cost methods for disease detection and monitoring (e.g. endemic diseases of livestock, priority plant and tree pests and diseases as identified through the UK Plant Health Risk Register)'. Deadline 1 Sept 2016.

<u>NERC/ AHRC/ ESRC Global Challenges Research Fund:</u> <u>Building Resilience.</u> Awards up to £200,000, open to proposals addressing resilience to natural and man-made environmental hazards in a range of developing world contexts. **Deadline 6 Sept 2016**.

<u>Newton Fund</u>: funds available for **Institutional Links** (for the development of research and innovation collaborations between the UK and partner countries), and **Researcher Links** (for workshops and travel grants for research visits in relation to Newton partner countries, with a focus on early career researchers). The UK's Newton Fund is classed as official development assistance (ODA); activities need to demonstrate their aim to contribute to a reduction in poverty, further sustainable development, or to improve the welfare of the population of Newton Fund countries. **Deadline 19 Sept 2016.**

<u>Crops for Human and Farmed Animal Nutrition</u> BBSRC welcomes proposals addressing a range of UK and globally relevant research questions. In particular applications are encouraged that address this challenge in crops relevant to developing countries, and those working in collaboration and/or consultation with the food industry. **Deadline 21 Sept 2016.**

<u>NERC Innovation Projects Open call.</u> Up to £125k available to support projects which focus upon generating user applicable outputs from past and/or current NERC supported research and translates them into outcomes that achieve impact, including 'Water risks to global food supply chains, ecosystems and communities'. **Deadline 27 Sept 2016.**

UK Royal Society International Exchanges 2016

The Royal Society's International Exchanges Scheme makes grants to UK scientists who seek new international collaborations. The scheme covers all areas of the life and physical sciences, except clinical medicine. **Deadline 18 Oct 16.**

<u>Agri-Tech Catalyst</u>, Innovate UK Funding Competition. UK businesses and universities can apply for a share of £4 million to work with developing country partners on agri-tech innovations — a good opportunity to explore technology transfer to a new market. **Deadline for expressions of interest 26 Oct 2016** (consortia building workshop 14 Sept).

<u>BBSRC Call 2 GFS: Resilience of the UK Food System in a Global Context.</u> Will support interdisciplinary projects from 1-5 years' duration, costing up to £2.8m. Must address one or more of the programme's thematic priorities including optimising resilience of food supply chains, and influencing food choice for





health, resilience and sustainability. **Outline application deadline 10 Nov 2016.** Town meeting 26 Sept, London – register by 16 Sept.
