Kor, Y, Prabhu, J, Esposito, M. <u>How large food retailers can help solve the food waste</u> <u>crisis.</u> *Harvard Business Review,* Dec 2017. IRC members **Professor Yasemin Kor** and **Professor Jaideep Prabhu** were involved in developing this four-pronged strategy to help retailers.

Alvarado, M *et al.* <u>Trends in beverage prices following the introduction of a tax on sugar-</u> <u>sweetened beverages in Barbados.</u> *Prev Med,* Dec 2017. IRC members **Dr Jean Adams** and **Dr Nigel Unwin** were involved in this descriptive analysis of initial price changes following implementation of a SSB tax using price data provided by a major supermarket chain in Barbados.





Saar, KL *et al.* Enhancing power density of biophotovoltaics by decoupling storage and power delivery. Nature Energy, Jan 2018. IRC member **Dr Paulo Bombelli** was involved in this work to develop a new algae-powered fuel cell five times more efficient than existing models.
