<u>GCRF Global Research Translation Awards</u>. Awards aim to accelerate the delivery of development impact from previous GCRF funded research (by UKRI, Academies or other delivery partners). UK and DAC based research organisations with at least one Principal or Co-Investigator on a GCRF award will be eligible to submit an application for up to £800,000 over 18 months. **Deadline 11 July.** (University of Cambridge applicants must follow internal procedures for selection).

BBSRC/ DEFRA/ NERC/ Scottish Gov: <u>Understanding and countering bacterial plant diseases</u>. Applications for up to £2.5m, for up to 3 years, for projects beginning by 1 May 2020. **Deadline 25** July.

OECD: <u>Conference sponsorship grants within agriculture, forestry and fisheries research.</u> For organising a conference; funds cover travel for invited speakers and a contribution towards publication of the proceedings. **Deadline 10 Sept.**
