FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Global Challenges Research Fund: Foundation Awards for Agriculture and Food Systems Research
The Fund, involving BBSRC, MRC, AHRC, ESRC and NERC, was created to ensure that UK research
takes a leading role in addressing the problems faced by developing countries. Foundation Awards

<u>Call for Nominations</u> for the Kuwait Foundation for the Advancement of Sciences <u>Al Sumait Prize</u> <u>for African Development in Food Security</u>, from individuals and institutions who, through their work and innovations have made significant contributions to food security in Africa. <u>Prize US \$1 million</u>. <u>Deadline extended to 30 June 2016</u>.

Conservation, Food, and Health Foundation (CHF) Grants for Grassroots Development

The CFH Foundation makes grants to non-profit organisations worldwide for projects in conservation, sustainable agriculture, and health in developing countries. The average grant is approximately US\$20,000. **Deadline 1 July 2016.**

<u>Public Engagement Seed Fund</u>: A new opportunity for University of Cambridge researchers to apply for grants of up to £3,000 to undertake innovative, research-focused public engagement activities. **Deadline Friday 1 July 2016.**

Genome editing and the future of farming – sponsorships for early-career researchers. The BBSRC is inviting applications for funding to attend this event at the Roslin Institute on 6 Sept 2016. The event is in the field of food security and the livestock sector, particularly in the genetic techniques to improve livestock and the regulatory issues surrounding these new technologies. **Deadline 6 July 2016.**

<u>Priming Food Partnerships</u> – a multi-research council call aiming to foster new partnerships in pre-competitive research between the food industry, academia and the wider research base in the public and third sectors to work together on pre-competitive research, with the ultimate aim of stimulating innovative research and technological advances of relevance to the food industry. Expressions of interest due 4pm, 13th July; Sandpit workshop 19-21 Sept 2016.

BBSRC <u>Flexible Interchange Programme (FLIP) awards</u>. This grant supports the movement of people and exchange of knowledge / technology / skills, and developing bioscience research / researchers. **Deadline 17 August 2016**.

<u>African Union, ET</u> invites proposals for projects up to \$1,000,000, which aim to eradicate hunger and ensure food and nutrition security, by using science and technology research to contribute to Africa's poverty reduction strategies, economic growth and social development efforts. Applications must involve a partnership of at least three organisations, including two African countries. **Deadline 17 Aug 2016.**

<u>Crops for Human and Farmed Animal Nutrition</u> BBSRC welcomes proposals addressing a range of UK and globally relevant research questions. In particular applications are encouraged that address this challenge in crops relevant to developing countries, and those working in collaboration and/or consultation with the food industry. **Deadline 21 Sept 2016.**

The Douglas Bomford Trust invites applications for its <u>postgraduate research funding</u>. This aims to advance knowledge, understanding, practice, competence and capability in the application of engineering and physical science to agriculture, horticulture, forestry, amenity and land based and





biological activities for the benefit of the environment and mankind. Applications requesting over £1,500 will be considered. **Deadline 1 October 2016.**

The Royal Society's International Exchanges Scheme makes grants to UK scientists who seek new international collaborations. The scheme covers all areas of the life and physical sciences, except clinical medicine. **Deadline 18 October 2016.**

<u>AHRC Networking Grants available</u> to support forums for the discussion and exchange of ideas on a specified thematic area, issue or problem through, for example, a short-term series of workshops, seminars, networking activities or other events. The aim is to stimulate new debate across boundaries. Proposals should explore new areas, be multi-institutional and can include creative or innovative approaches or entrepreneurship. No deadline.
