# **UK Royal Society International Exchanges 2016**

The Royal Society's International Exchanges Scheme makes grants to UK scientists who seek new international collaborations. The scheme covers all areas of the life and physical sciences, except clinical medicine. **Deadline 18 Oct 16.** 

Agri-Tech Catalyst, Innovate UK Funding Competition. UK businesses and universities can apply for a share of £4 million to work with developing country partners on agri-tech innovations – a good opportunity to explore technology transfer to a new market. Deadline for expressions of interest 26 Oct 2016 and 25 Jan 2017.

Agri-Tech in China: Newton Network+ (ATCNN) will support a range of activities to develop innovative solutions for some of the critical challenges impacting China's agri-tech and agri-food sectors. They particularly seek to enable translation of UK excellence in satellite imaging, remote sensing, smart sensors, robotics and data-intensive science into new solutions for productivity and sustainability in rural China. Deadline: noon, 31 Oct 2016.

<u>World Bank Big Data Innovation Challenge</u> This calls for big data solutions and prototypes that address climate change-related issues pertaining to food security, nutrition, landscapes, forestry and watersheds. Two prizes of USD 10,000 each are available. **Deadline 9 Nov 2016.** 

BBSRC Call 2 GFS: Resilience of the UK Food System in a Global Context. Will support interdisciplinary projects from 1-5 years' duration, costing up to £2.8m.
