ARUA – UKRI GCRF Partnership Programme for Capacity Building: Research Excellence. To build significant capacity for science and research across African universities, this call will support up to six joint research projects addressing aspects of the Sustainable Development Goals. **Call for outline proposals closes 15 August, 4pm.**

University of Cambridge/ affiliated institutions only <u>ALBORADA Research Fund 2019</u> Awards of between £1,000-£20,000 for research costs, travel, and training activities in all disciplines that initiate or strengthen research collaborations with sub-Saharan African institutions. **Deadline 2 Sept.**

<u>Joint BBSRC-NERC-GCRF Sustainable Enhancement of Agriculture and Aquaculture.</u> To support the translation of research in Low and Middle Income Countries on the DAC list of ODA recipients in the Sub-Saharan Africa, Southern Asia and South-Eastern Asia regions. OTHER OPPORTUNITIES

Henry Dimbleby has launched a year-long review of the food system that will lead to the publication of a new <u>National Food Strategy</u> for the UK Government. His team will be consulting experts around the world; get in touch if you would like to be involved.

<u>The Bennett Prospect Prize</u> for Public Policy aims to encourage early career researchers and policy professionals to explore creative and generative solutions to a pressing public policy question of our age.
