<u>UK-South Africa partnership grants to address antimicrobial resistance (AMR)</u>. The South African Medical Research Council and the UK Medical Research Council (whose contribution is provided by the UK's Newton Fund) have announced R9 million funding to foster innovation in addressing AMR, for research partnerships between South African and UK researchers. Can also include work in other sub-Saharan African countries. **Deadline 2 Dec 2016.**

<u>Validation of Diagnostic Tools for Animal and Plant Health.</u> Up to €3M from Horizon 2020 to harmonise and validate existing and new protocols for the detection and quantification of pathogens and other factors of concern for the health of plants and terrestrial animals, and correlates of infection/immunity. **Deadline 14 Feb 2017.**
