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NEWS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

The BBSRC-supported Joint Programming Initiative on Agriculture, Food Security and Climate Change (FACCE-JPI) has revised its <u>Strategic Research Agenda</u>, to set out clear research priorities on agriculture, food security and climate change in Europe. FACCE-JPI lists strategic actions to achieve these goals and align current and future national research programmes.

The European Commission has opened a Public Online Consultation on PRIMA

(Partnership for Research and Innovation in the Mediterranean Area in Horizon 2020) - a new research and innovation initiative for sustainable food production and water management in the Mediterranean area - to collect views and opinions on the scope, objectives, and expected impacts of PRIMA. Contributions are sought **by 24 April 2016**, following which there will be an event in the first quarter of 2016 to further involve the most directly affected stakeholders of the PRIMA initiative.

<u>Agri-tech EAST has announced a Business Plan competition: GROW</u>, aiming to encourage an entrepreneurial culture in agri-tech. Every entrant gets the support and guidance of a mentor, and the winner will receive £1,000 to help them progress their business plan into practice. Register interest **by 7 March 2016**.

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Research Grant Applications at CRASSH

CRASSH is interested in continuing its rolling programme of interdisciplinary, collaborative research projects beyond the current cycle (2016-17) and welcomes approaches from academics who would like to base their projects in this unique research environment.

ESRC Impact Acceleration Account: The University's Research Strategy Office coordinates the Impact Fund, which provides flexible funding for impact projects in social science disciplines. Awards of 10,000-£20,000 are available to significantly increase the probability of the ideas and findings generated by the research having an impact on the private, public and third sectors. **Bids are due by 5pm on 22nd February.**

UK Royal Society International Exchanges 2016

The Royal Society's International Exchanges Scheme makes grants to UK scientists who seek new international collaborations. The scheme covers all areas of the life and physical sciences, except clinical medicine (deadlines 23 February 2016; 07 June 2016; and 18 October 2016).

<u>The ERA-NET Sustainable Animal Production (SusAn</u>) has launched a call for transnational research proposals on sustainable animal production. Up to €300,000 can be requested per project from any one funding party (deadline for pre-proposals 29 March 2016).

DEFRA European Innovation Partnership for Agricultural Productivity and Sustainability grant (EIP-Agri)

Supports projects which link research, farming and forestry practice to encourage innovation and improve productivity and sustainability in the agricultural sector. Grants are worth between £5,000 and £150,000 for up to three years. The total budget is worth £5 million (deadline 31 March 2016).

EC Research and Innovation (Horizon 2020) Marie Sklodowska-Curie Research Fellowships 2016

The Marie Sklodowska-Curie Research Fellowships include the Research and Innovation Staff Exchange (RISE). RISE aims to develop partnerships at the international level in Europe and outside Europe in academic and non-academic sectors. The organisations constituting the partnerships contribute to joint research and innovation by seconding and/or hosting eligible staff members (deadline 28 April 2016).

The ERA-NET for monitoring and mitigation of Greenhouse gases from agri- and silvi-

<u>culture</u> is planning to launch a call for transnational research proposals under the ERAONET Cofund scheme of Horizon 2020 of the European Commission on March 1, 2016 (deadline for pre-proposals 29 April 2015).



Community Resource for Wheat Transformation This funding from NIAB provides capacity for **50 genes** to be transformed into wheat free of charge. Half of this resource is reserved for researchers working on model crops, to encourage early testing of novel genes in wheat. The remaining half of the resource is reserved for researchers working on UK cereal crops, wheat and barley. This project has been funded for 5 years by the BBSRC Bioinformatics & Biological Resources fund (deadline 31 May 2016).

Conservation, Food, and Health Foundation (CHF) Grants for Grassroots Development

The CFH Foundation makes grants to non-profit organisations worldwide for projects in conservation, sustainable agriculture, and health in developing countries. The average grant is approximately US\$20,000 (deadline 1 July 2016).
